Introduction to the Roots of Retention™

1. Curiosity – The Spark of Learning

Curiosity is the seed. It is the natural desire to know, explore, and ask questions. Without curiosity, learning becomes a chore.

Encourage curiosity by letting children ask questions freely, explore topics they love, and follow trails of interest.

Practical Ideas:

- Create a 'Wonder Wall' where kids can post things they're curious about.
- Use open-ended prompts like 'What do you think would happen if...?'
- Let your child lead one day a week by picking the topic they want to explore.



2. Connection – Make it Personal

Connection is the root system. When learning is tied to something meaningful, emotional, or relational, it sticks.

Children remember lessons when they feel something or experience it in the context of love, trust, story, or sensory memory.

Practical Ideas:

- Teach through storytelling. Tie lessons to family history, Bible stories, or fables.
- Learn together. Sit beside your child, ask questions, and share discoveries.
- Create rituals around learning, like nature walks or teatime discussions.



3. Context – Learning with Purpose

Context is the soil. It's how we make sense of knowledge in the real world.

When kids understand why something matters and how it's used, it becomes part of their worldview.

Practical Ideas:

- Teach math through cooking, building, or budgeting.
- Connect language to communication: writing letters, making signs, storytelling.
- Discuss how different lessons reflect God's order and beauty in the world.



Bringing the Roots Together

A single lesson can include all three roots:

Example: Studying Seeds

- **Curiosity:** Ask, 'What's inside a seed? Why do some grow fast?'
- **Connection:** Read a parable of Jesus about seeds or plant something together.
- **Context:** Observe real seeds, track growth, cook foods with seeds.

When you weave these three roots into each lesson, you help your child form deep and joyful understanding.



Capturing the Joy of Learning

True learning brings light to the eyes and peace to the heart. When a child feels safe, seen, and free to explore, they grow.

Tips for nurturing joyful learning:

- Let go of rigid outcomes—focus on process and discovery.
- Keep a journal of your child's questions and interests.
- Celebrate growth, not just mastery.
- Pray together before learning. Invite God into your homeschool rhythm.



How to Use This Method at Home

- Use the Roots of Retention™ as a planning tool.
- Each week, ask: How am I sparking curiosity? Building connection? Providing context?
- Keep lessons short, gentle, and rooted in your child's world.
- Observe. Listen. Adjust. Let your learner teach you how they learn best.



Sample Weekly Rhythm

Here's a simple weekly rhythm using the Roots of Retention™:

- *Monday*: Explore a new topic through curiosity (books, questions, videos).
- *Tuesday*: Build connection (hands-on, discussion, story).
- *Wednesday*: Ground it in context (field trip, application, nature walk).
- *Thursday*: Reflect and document (draw, journal, tell a story).
- *Friday*: Celebrate and rest. Light review or creative play.

You don't need to be perfect. You just need to be present.


